

HANDS OF HIAWATHA



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The living history museum on Onondaga Parkway, formerly known as Sainte Marie Among the Iroquois, told the story of the Haudenosaunee from the perspective of the French Jesuits who encountered them on the shore of Onondaga Lake in the 17th century. Now the facility is called Ska-nonh Great Law of Peace Center, and it tells the story from the perspective of the Iroquois Confederacy. Ska-nonh (SCAN-oh) exhibits, including on the legend of Hiawatha (above), opened to the public Saturday. Regular hours are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Wednesdays through Saturdays and 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sundays. Regular admission will be \$5 per person and children under 12 are free.
